## **LOOKING UP!**

Four bright new barn quilts have sprouted up in Caledonia. Members of the Conservancy painted the Four Flags quilt for the Grove family farm years ago. This January, Kathi Wilson, executive director of the Racine Arts Council and original founder of Racine county's Quilts On Barns project, asked if I would design one of three they planned to add for 2020. I agreed to do one, if it could have a horse. It was such fun I ended up creating a total of 4 quilts for our area.

Nancy Pierce serves on both the Racine Arts Council board and cochairs the CC's Outreach committee. She knew I'd painted some quilts for my own farm, so it was her idea to get Kathi and me introduced again, with this delightful result. The quilts will be featured in the Arts Council's Quilts On Barns Road Rally coming October 10!

It was perfect timing to have community service to focus on during the lockdown.

I felt very cheered to realize people would enjoy seeing these when they were out driving around again.

With three layers of primer and three layers of each paint color on top of that, it took about 50 hours per quilt. I needed strong motivation to keep going!

My husband, Kjell Erlandsson, was a huge help in handling all the lifting and precise layout of my designs. We cleared the lower level in our house and set up sawhorses and plastic floor covers. I had hoped to have some locals and the Pony Club members over to help paint details, but with everyone quarantined that wasn't possible. Little by little each day the patterns took shape just fine. People enjoyed watching their progress on Facebook.

First, it was fun to match the frame color of "Blue Ribbon Horse" to the exact roof of the Racine County Pony Club barn (5518 Highway 31). It's Blueberry! The central white horse shape was inspired by my favorite chocolate mold.

Next, "Rusty Horseshoes" hangs on Rusty Stacey's barn (5750 Five Mile Road), and yes I shamelessly used Green Bay Packer/John Deere tractor colors. The black horse is similar to the logo of our local Riders of Caledonia (ROC) group, which sponsored this one. Rusty thought it looked suspiciously like my black mare but chuckled and said that's okay, I like Morgans! Rusty's family has generously allowed us to ride over their land for many decades. Rusty himself was a stalwart member of the fabled King's Crazies riders, and serves the community on many committees, including the Conservancy preservation committee.

"Quarter Horse Cross" is on Drs. Debbie and Ric Palmer's barn (7930 Botting Road). Elegant and understated is their style, but the design didn't start out that way. Deb chairs and hosts the conservancy picnic, along with various conservancy meetings and they are famous for their mission trips which provide expert dentistry in disadvantaged countries. During one of our conservancy meetings Deb was so enthused about the quilts I was doing that she wondered aloud where she could get one. Her bubbly personality mesmerized me into gifting one to her! The first design was met with a gently lukewarm reception and in hindsight I realize it did look like four large Casper the Friendly Ghosts in the corners of it! Well they ARE a dental family dynasty so I was trying to include teeth! Deb borrowed my color samples and picked hues to match their barn. I love the end result. The white horse represents their grandchildren's show horse, Mario.

The fourth quilt "Side-Saddle Tiger Lady" is too far back for public viewing but horseback riders will see it on the trail around our barn. It was a takeoff on an illustration by the fantastic French artist Alfred Chantrey Corbould 1852-1920. He illustrated the cover of my favorite sidesaddle book. Not wanting to go out for more paint during lockdown, I used a color left over from the Pony Club's painted leather strap. It worked well to give an oriental feel to the sort of etchinginspired cartoon. It'll be fun to get a

future photo of my sidesaddle friends and me next to this quilt!

Kjell framed the quilt backs and masterminded hanging two using our tractor, which, given wind and weight was not easy.

We hope you'll enjoy the quilts throughout the seasons and look for them to be part of a quilt road rally event the Racine Arts Council will be putting on in the fall.

## TALES FROM THE TRAIL

In these uncertain times of social distancing, masks, covid-19, and face time or zoom calls with your family and friends, it is reassuring to know that nature is still the same. We can count on the land to grow the spring flowers, and have leaves on the trees, salamanders, toads, worms and other living things out in nature. I find myself so much more relaxed after a walk on the CC trails, even when it is pulling bags full of garlic mustard!

The stewardship committee has also had to adjust to not meeting in person every month. Instead we have sent out agendas by email and members have responded on the work that they have done. Vanessa Luther did a wonderful job of removing logs that were blocking the creek at the Short Road Trailhead and also cut a new horse trail down the hill at the right of way. Matt Johnsrud removed logs that were too big for Vanessa to cut with a hand saw and cut down multiple ash trees at the Neighborhood Central

Walk. Wendy McCalvy and Jim Hooten installed multiple signs at Kings Corner, and Tabor Woods. Wendy organized two garlic mustard pulls. We had 14 people come out in pairs to cut down the small trees growing in the prairie at the Trout Ponds. They all stayed apart from each other, wore masks, and got a lot of work done! One day, we drove a van from the Short Road Trailhead to the right of way to fill in the holes left by numerous animals. The holes were a safety hazard right in the pathway. Everything went well until the van got stuck in the mud near the parking lot. Our neighbor, Chad Ishman, came out with his Superman cape on and got us unstuck. We were a muddy soggy mess, but did a lot of laughing once the van was out. Jo Stys has organized a group of volunteers at the Neighborhood Central Walk to spread wood chips, plant trees, and pull garlic mustard. Many other volunteers both old and new ones did their part to clean the trails from fallen trees, picked up trash in the ditches along CC lands,

pulled garlic mustard, and helped out any way they could. We could not do it without all of our volunteers. Thanks so much!

## **RON ENDRIS & HIS FREE PRAIRIE SEEDS**

We would like you to meet Ron Endris from Verona, Wisconsin. For over 10 years as a private volunteer he has provided native prairie, savanna, woodland & wetland seeds FOR FREE to non-profits in the area. Ron has access/permission to collect seeds on thousands of acres of land in the area including all Dane County Parks, Ice Age Trail sites, some Prairie Enthusiasts sites, and a number of large land trusts and conservancies.

He used to process the seed at his house but over the last 5 years has partnered with Dane County Parks. Ron harvests seed on his own and also with volunteer groups. The harvests are combined. Dane County has a new warehouse that they use for drying, hammer milling, and screening the seed. When that process is completed they split the pure seed in half and they supply their park plantings and he donates his seeds to groups like ours. To give you an idea of the size of what they do, this year's harvest ended up

having over 1,800 lbs pure seed of over 200 species representing a value of over \$650,000. This year Dane Co has a lot of acres to plant so they split the harvest approximately 70%/30%. That still gave him a lot of seed to donate.

All seed is individually bagged and labeled. Labels include info like common and scientific names, sun/shade, dry/wet and height. Ron also provides a spreadsheet of what you have received with the same info as well as the weight and value of each species. You will know the total poundage of grass, forbs, sedges and shrubs and the total value of the donation. Ron gave us 107 different species of plants, some for the woodlands and some for the prairie. The total number of pounds of seed that he gave us was 34.9 pounds worth \$13,109.50!!

The King's Corner committee has been working on a plan to decide where to plant some of the seed, what to plant,

and how to prepare the land in order to have optimal success in getting the seeds to grow. Prairie plants may take several years before they start to flower so we must be patient. As you pass King's Corner, on the corner of 5 Mile Road and Highway 31, take a look and watch the prairie bloom with color over the next few years.

# KING'S CORNER UPDATES

Wendy McCalvy donated \$4,000 to the Conservancy last fall for the removal of dead ash trees on King's Corner. The money will pay to hire the operator of a large forest mower which can chip a large tree in very short time. Trees that are near trails and Five Mile Road will be targeted. Because the ground never froze completely last winter, the project is being delayed for dry weather.

A new walking trail on Kings Corner was cleared last year by Conservancy volunteers and Americorps volunteers. The last connection has been completed. The trail runs west from the parking area in two directions into the wooded section. It is designed to cross over, but avoid the wider horse trails. New signs, smaller than our traditional ones, will help guide walkers to the two wooded trail circles as



well as to the grassy areas east of the parking lot. A map of the walking trails and horse trails is on the **Caledoniaconservancy.org** website.

# **DAVID LORENCE WOODS-HERE'S HOPING!**

We wanted to let you know that preservation committee was contacted by a landowner about seven acres that is between the right-of-way and the Renak Polak State Natural Area, and borders our Short Road Trail Head. After committee review we recommended the Conservancy apply for a Department of Natural Resources Knowles—Nelson grant. The Board passed a resolution that allowed us to proceed with the grant review and application process.

The woods are part of a 20 acre parcel owned by David Lorence. David grew up in the area and his family were original pioneers who lived in a log cabin on what is now Short Road. This seven-acre "cut out" is old growth woods and boasts the same unique flora as the State natural area to the west. Marla Wishau compiled the grant information needed in the application, and Sandy DeWalt handled all the appraisal details and is liaison to the assigned DNR grant specialist.

We submitted the grant in time for the May 1st deadline, and we are told it might take months to process; it depends on how many other applicants there are for the funds available. Now we have to wait to see if the grant is approved before we move forward. Wish us luck!! (And THANK YOU to Sandy and Marla for accomplishing the complex application at speed during challenging times!!!)

## PRESERVATION PRIORITIES

Since the beginning, we've always voiced a desire to preserve the old North Shore Railroad Right Of Way from the Root River to County Line Road. The Preservation Committee has been working to make the process of land evaluation more streamlined. Our rating system gives higher value to land segments and property adjoining the Right Of Way which connects the trail system.

Because the Right Of Way is our priority, we are always thinking about what properties would secure connectivity.

When landowners reach out to us, we offer information handouts, brochures and power point presentations to explain options. Ideas like conservation easements, leases, donations, sales or any other ways of securing the land are explored.

The Ehrlich, Marshall, Neubauer, Rehbein, Rohner, Schumann, and Short families have all given part of the backbone of this area. Sometimes referred to as "The Spine", the Right Of Way is indeed our lifeline to trails nearby. Anyone who rides or walks it, knows what a unique and beautiful resource we're blessed with, since its existence allows us to easily and safely share the area with each other.

We are truly appreciative of the Right Of Way segments added to our trail system in 2019. The Conservancy is grateful and delighted to continue to meet with landowners to discuss options and answer any questions about how to preserve additional parts of the trails.

## **SCHOOL TO NATURE**

We pivoted! This spring's School To Nature (S2N) program had to be cancelled (due to the pandemic). We still wanted to bring nature into the lives of our students. We forwarded a website from the DNR's Project Learning Tree, to the teachers who were to participate in the spring program. This had activities that students could do in their own backyards, and we asked the teachers to pass this information on to their students.

In addition, Barb Hugier who is a member of the S2N's committee, created a Scavenger Hunt for parents to do with their children at Tabor Woods. Directions for the hunt were put in the kiosk located near the entrance to Tabor

Woods (McCalvy Section). We had been planning on using a Scavenger Hunt with our S2N program when the weather didn't permit us to do the usual curriculum and Barb took the initiative to create this activity now so that children could have some fun when walking the Tabor Woods trails.

We don't know if we'll be able to do our fall program, which runs the last week in September and first week in October, at the Trout Ponds/Prairie. We will have to wait and see if the schools will be back in session and if classes will be allowed to go on field trips. So many unknowns at this time. Please feel free to contact me if you would like to volunteer for our School

# RACINE COUNTY VOLUNTEER CENTER ENVIRONMENTAL AWARD WINNER: DAVE HECHT

Dave was chosen for his steadfast work in the field on the various properties the Caledonia Conservancy preserves for future generations.

Dave has a deep appreciation of the environment. He works on maintaining our walking and equestrian trails and also has been instrumental in identifying and controlling non-native invasive species on the larger properties owned by the Conservancy. He is an active member of the King's Corner subcommittee of Stewardship. Dave is a fount of information and an able teacher (his former career) sharing information with our members and the public. He created leaflets about garlic mustard and other common invasive plants in the area, which have been shared with

the neighbors of our properties. Jo Stys nominated him and has worked with him on several projects planting, seeding shrubs, trees and prairie plants as well as pulling garlic mustard. She said he creates a team atmosphere with children, teens and adults, and makes the work, feel like fun. He encourages people to feel ownership of the land by their efforts.

This past fall Dave took the lead in obtaining prairie perennial flower seed, which was hand cast (seeded). These flowers will brighten the prairie at the King's Corner property at 5 Mile and Hwy 31.

"It is easy and enjoyable to see the native plants," said Dave recently. He also commented, "The adage 'all the flowers of all the tomorrows are in the seeds of today' is true. Planting and seeding brings beauty and life into our environment."



## AN OFFICIAL LITTLE LIBRARY

#### #1 For Fun:

For fun, education and a little challenge, Barb placed plaques with questions and answers in the McCalvy section of Tabor Woods. The green colored plaques have harder questions for adults and older kids. Easier questions are on natural colored plaques. Those are geared for younger kids, but who are old enough to read. Have fun with the family, and see how many questions about nature you can answer. See the green and yellow index cards at the kiosk.

## **#2 Scavenger Hunt:**

At this time there is a scavenger hunt in Tabor Woods, all three sections. Each hunt has eight pictures of items that can be found in the woods. At the moment, hunt number two is posted at the kiosk. Hunt number three started May 29th. After June 12th, all three hunts will be

posted at the kiosk, and remain there for the summer for families to enjoy. The rules and pictures are at the kiosk, also on the website. You take a photo of the pictures with your phone, and photograph the trail map if you don't know your way around the trails. Have a little family bet going as to who can find the most items. Most of all enjoy your walk in the woods with nature.

#### #3 Teaching:

Barb says "The educational area of King's Corner is now underway. Items have been planned. The next step is to get volunteers to help with more planning and building of the items. We will not be building playground equipment. I am always looking for new ideas and people to help with them. We will be featuring items for the young kids as well as for older kids. We may even throw in some

interesting items for the parents. Items will be made to stimulate not only the kid's brains, but their bodies. We hope to see parents out walking with the kids on all of King's Corner, and enjoying all the items that will be displayed. The project will take a few years to complete. 
# Remembering Terry Tollaksen
