# Message from the President, Kjell Erlandsson



I will open with an existential question; who does the Conservancy belong to? To answer... It belongs to the community around us. It belongs to everyone--our sponsors, donors, supporters, and volunteers. Although Caledonia is part of the registered name, the Conservancy also belongs to people in the surrounding communities. The Conservancy conducts its affairs for the common good. Our land has public access, and everybody can enjoy it. We have plenty of space around us for rural character and natural areas. It doesn't all have to be developed. We can enjoy greenspace relief.

The Conservancy connects people to the land. To borrow from L.L. Bean, "Be an outsider." And the Conservancy connects people with people and offers a great way to get together with friends that share your values.

Horse life is a big part of the Conservancy. We have 40 miles of horse trails, some of it in partnership with neighboring private landowners, who are key to linking the different pieces of Conservancy land.

This summer, the Conservancy hosted its annual Mane Event, a treasure hunt ride around our horse trails, which attracted more than 60 horseback riders. People came together for a fun day to ride and talk about horse adventures. A big shoutout to all the volunteers who made it happen.

Caledonia's local Equine Trail Sports group held two obstacle events, where the proceeds went to the benefit of the Conservancy. These are judged events, where you compete through a series of obstacles. These events attracted nearly 100 participants, some of which came with their horses from over 100 miles away.

We brought our School to Nature programs back on track after the nasty virus hiatus. We had more than 150 schoolchildren through the program this year. Kudos to the volunteers for giving so freely of their time.

The Conservancy acquired the Lorence Family Woods, 7 acres, which is north of Five Mile Road at the Short Road Trail Head. This acquisition was funded by a grant from the Wisconsin DNR. Everybody is welcome to hike or ride their horse there. You will find some beautiful old trees. This land connects to the UW Renak-Polak natural area, worth further exploration.

On the administrative side, we streamlined our financial affairs to reduce expenses. This is part of being good stewards of our financial resources, and in the end, respects donors, sponsors, and volunteers. A shoutout to Suzi Zierten for embracing this initiative with enthusiasm.

We also started looking at how we use signs on our trails and land, and what the signs should look like. We have a variety of signs at our properties to give information and direction. Signs we put up are part of our face to the community, and we want them to truly represent the Conservancy aesthetics, and so to project our values and the values of our sponsors and donors.

So, all in all, it has been a good year thus far. We look forward to finishing the year with an online auction.

The future showcase prairie flower bed area along Hwy 31 has the weeds killed and now has winter wheat planted. When the wheat starts growing, we can add all of our showcase flower seeds.

In the same area of the showcase flower bed, Sandy DeWalt donated a Burr Oak tree which we have been watering religiously. It has a plastic donut around the tree, and under it we have been providing a home for about a half dozen baby garter snakes, and lately one blue spotted salamander. We also watered a number of baby trees planted last summer.

The Terry Tollaksen Memorial Garden was completed this year. Water had to be brought in a few times to help the new plants thrive. Wild flowers grew up all around the bushes and trees. The flowers were done blooming around the time of a lovely dedication for the memorial

## School to Nature 2022

The S2N program began in 2010 and over the years has held a spring and fall program. Sixth graders come to Tabor Woods in spring and 4th graders come to the Trout Ponds/Prairie in fall.

This fall we hosted 156- 4th graders from Olympia Brown, Red Apple, and Racine Christian schools. We had about fifty students at each field trip. The volunteers led groups of 5-7 students and followed a marked trail through the ponds, prairie, woods and down to the Root River. Along the way, they were able to measure the tall cup plants and look for insects, amphibians, and flowers. At the parking lot they used the hand held microscopes at the pond water table to see what lives in the ponds. They also visited the nature tables that had a variety of skulls, antlers, furs, bird's nest, and turtle shells on them.



# Behind-The-Scenes Work That Acquired the Lorence Woods by Marla Wishau



The Caledonia Conservancy Preservation Committee occasionally applies for State of Wisconsin Department of Natural Resource grants. It is not often that we apply for these grants, but when we have a recent land donation, we look to see if there is additional land where we can use the donation as a match property. We especially try to protect any green space on or near the Right of Way (ROW) trail in Caledonia.

The grant that we have had success with is the Knowles Nelson Stewardship Program. Since 1989, this program has been supported by the Wisconsin legislators who want to prioritize land protection, clean water and outdoor recreation for Wisconsin residents. Activities like fishing, hunting, multiuse trails, campgrounds, boat launches and conservation activities are projects the Knowles Nelson grant supports. The Urban Green Space is a subprogram of the Stewardship Program. It specifically supports open natural space within or in proximity to urban development that has scenic, ecological or natural values. This program is the one we recently had applied for.

The grant process is not simple and it is not free. Surveys and Certified Survey Maps are required, as are title searches and "Yellow Book" appraisals on both the property to purchase, and the donated properties. Because of this investment, the Preservation Committee rates the property to make sure it meets Caledonia Conservancy's mission and objectives, as well as having a patient and willing seller. If all the stars line up, we prepare to send the pre-approval to the DNR, followed by the completed grant (which is a large amount of paperwork in itself!) for consideration. We did this with the David Lorence Property. The land we wrote a grant for and acquired is a portion of a 20-acre parcel on 5 Mile Road. The land is wooded and it is between property owned by the Conservancy and the State of Wisconsin Natural Area known as the Renak-Polak Woods. The photo shows a darker red rectangle indicating where the land is located. We initially applied in 2020, but we were not selected as a recipient of the grant. Even though our competition was stiff, we reapplied in 2021. We were successful in securing the grant. We closed on the property in June 2022. Vanessa Luther, Sandy DeWalt and the Stewardship Committee has already charted out new trails to extend into these beautiful woods.

Thanks to the donation of 20 acres of woods by Robin Ehrlich Eastham and Sue Ehrlich Smith, we were able to secure the additional 7 acres of the forest that adjoin our current ROW and the Short Road Trailhead. The map shows all the preserved Lorence Woods in dark red and the Short Road Trailhead on its east side that connects to the right of way. With the Lorence Woods acquisition, the CC has now preserved over 300 acres of natural land in Caledonia. There are hiking and horse trails on all of the land that are open to the public dawn to dusk.

Members of the CC Equestrian Committee spent hours in chilly weather carefully replacing old spots of paint with these. Placed at a uniform height (where we could reach and have arm power to attach them while perched precariously on a mounting block!), and all along one side of the trail for easy rider reference (try finding trees the right distance apart!). They are on the trail side face of the trees to not be obscured by foliage. We used stainless steel nuts to space them from being flush with the tree while allowing for tree growth (Like the national Ice Age Trail does).

With approval from the new CC Signage committee and horse trail maintenance funds gifted by the local Equine Trail Sport obstacle event fundraisers (they donated \$3714.37 this year!), it was accomplished. The trails were laid out to accommodate the beautiful bigger beech, maples and others that line it. If anyone gets lost now we can add more trail jewelry (well the markers are actually pretty!) so give it a test ride and enjoy the golden glory of the seasons! their cell phone location is on. So, when you're out on the trails, make sure you have your cell phone on your person and the location in the ON position (should be in your cell phone settings)!! 
